Many animals hibernate.




Many festivals are celebrated during the winter including Christmas, New Year, Hanukkah, and Valentine's Day.


There are several outside activities that people enjoy in the winter season such as making snowmen, sledding, and ice skating. Cold weather and snow can be a lot of fun!

What Happens in Winter?

In winter the deciduous trees lose nearly all of their leaves. Tiny buds can be seen tightly wrapped together on tree branches. When the weather begins to warm in spring, the buds lengthen and begin to grow.



Evergreens keep their leaves.
People bring evergreen trees inside and decorate them as Christmas trees.



What Happens to Animals in Winter?

The weather becomes much colder in the winter.

People can wear warm clothes and buy their food from stores.

This is not possible for animals, so how do they survive?

Hibernation:

Hibernation is the way that some animals survive through the winter. They find a safe place and fall into a very deep sleep. When the temperature is warmer, in the spring, they wake up again.



Migration:

Some birds fly south for the winter, where it is warmer. This is called migration. They go to a warmer place to find food.




Adaptation:

Not all birds migrate - some stay in their homes all winter. People can help these birds by feeding them. Other animals stay active in winter such as squirrels, rabbits, and foxes. It is more difficult for them to find food. Some animals grow more fur in winter to help them stay warm.





Winter Weather



The temperature outside drops during the winter.



When the temperature outside becomes very cold, water freezes and turns to ice.

Staying Warm



To stay warm, people wear extra clothing such as warm coats, hats, scarves, and gloves.

Hanukkah

Hanukkah is a Jewish winter holiday.

Hanukkah is the annual Festival of Lights which can occur from late November through late December. The date changes yearly as it follows the Jewish calendar.

The festival is a reminder of the recapture of a temple which had been taken from the Jewish people. When the temple was cleaned, the Ner Tamid, or everlasting light, was lit. But there was only enough oil to burn for one night. Eight days later the lamp was still lit. This was seen as a miracle, showing that God was on their side in the fight against evil.

Hanukkah is a time for family and friends to get together. There are special meals, songs, stories, and games. Food is cooked in oil to celebrate the miracle of the oil which burned in the temple.



Valentine's Day

Every February, in many parts of the world, flowers, cards, and gifts are exchanged between loved ones, all in the name of St. Valentine. But why do we celebrate this holiday?

St. Valentine was a doctor and a Christian priest.
